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

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EDITORIAL

We must record another troubled year aggravated by acts of violence and savagery. It was through one of these despicable acts that we suffered the loss of Arthur Abraham, a founder member of the St. Stanislaus Association and his two sons, Alec and Desmond, pupils of the College. These tragedies leave us with heavy hearts, and darken and dim our hopes. We are all too well aware that, if the wave of crime has been arrested, the true spirit of friendship and trust will not so easily be restored.

As in the basic society of the family, the innocent children suffer most when their parents are at loggerheads, so too in the society of the state. it is the youth who are handicapped and retarded in a more permanent way.

The schooling of our children has been conducted in the worst possible atmosphere of insecurity, tension, and fear. Many children have come to classes after sleepless nights, haunted by the cares of their homes; others have had interrupted schooling.

It is not surprising that the results of the G.C.E. and other public examinations were well below par, but it is certain that the deleterious effects of the times have been greater, the younger the children. Even more critical is the damage done by the present lawlessness on the moral and character training of our youth. There is nothing more fundamental to education than the feeling of security engendered by the parents and the teachers. In the promotion of education the state's first duty is to create this security by a due esteem and respect for the rights and authority of parents and teachers.

An uphill road lies ahead for us. Parents and teachers must make greater sacrifices than ever, and work together in harmony and understanding. Education is never free. The education in the home demands everything of parents, and education in the school makes almost as great demands on the teachers. All the money in the world will not meet the needs of Guianese youth, if there is not also the devotion, love, and generosity of dedicated men and women.

We wish to thank all who helped to compile and produce this number of the magazine, and all who contributed to the activities here recorded.

A special word of thanks must go to our advertisers who have carried much of the increased financial burden of printing. We trust that they will find some compensation in the increased demand by our readers for their products.

MAIN EVENTS OF THE YEAR

The year's activities were considerably hampered, as were those of most other bodies of a similar kind, by the long general strike in 1963. The proposed social for boys leaving college, planned for July, had to be cancelled, for this reason. After the strike, however, a number of activities were held and were well attended,

On August 30th, His Lordship Bishop R. L. Guilly, S.J., gave a short talk on the problems facing Catholic education and afterwards showed a number of slides of Rome and of the first session of the Ecumenical Council. This event was attended by Association members and their wives.

On September 27th, there was a social for the parents of new boys entering the College and this was extremely well attended.

On the 1st November, the College Bingo was held on the College Grounds at Brickdam and proved to be an outstanding success, realising the record profit of \$3,095.06.

On November 8th, the Annual Dinner was held at the Parochial Hall, there being seventy subscribers on this occasion. The occasion was enlivened by virtue of the opportunity it afforded of celebrating the outstanding achievement of the College in winning both Guiana Scholarships for boys.

On December 13th, the College held its Prize Day at Queen's College and the President moved the vote of thanks to the guest speaker, His Grace, the Archbishop of the West Indies.

MEMBERSHIP

The total membership of the Association at the close of the year 1963 was two hundred and sixty-eight (268) comprising nine (9) Life Members, one hundred and fifty (150) Ordinary members, seven (7) Country members, ten (10) Overseas members, twenty-nine (29) Associate members and sixty-three (63) Honorary members.

GENERAL

The year which started promisingly, was overshadowed in mid-passage by the long general strike but the last quarter produced enough activity to at least partly justify the early high hopes. Unfortunately, because of the unsettled state of the country,

membership fell off due to emigration and uncertainty about the future. Our printing costs in respect of the Magazine were unprecedentedly high and are largely responsible for our relatively poor financial position at year end. There is a hard year ahead for the new Committee of Management, but if the tasks are tackled in the vigorous and enlightened spirit which is supposed to be characteristic of old boys of the College, there is no reason why it should not be a successful and rewarding one as well.

APPRECIATION

The Committee would like to thank all those who have in any way contributed to the success of the year under review. As the outgoing President, I owe a special debt of gratitude to my colleagues on the Committee for their loyal and unstinting help.

And that was some change from the little homework and free afternoons at the College! But before us all there is the ever-present future on our minds.

I would like to wish you all the best for the future since this may be the last time many of my friends hear from me for a long while: I will be unable to reply to letters during my novitiate year. I ask you for your prayers and those who know me know too, how much I need their prayers.

Congratulations to St. Stanislaus College

Last year in an article entitled "Appreciation of St. Stanislaus College," I gave you the story of my own son Peter, and what the College did for him. This year I am going to tell you of what it has done for other people's sons. It was very pleasing for me to pick up a Toronto newspaper, and see the smiling face of an ex St. Stanislaus Boy. His picture appeared among nine others who had succeeded in winning an Ontario Government Scholarship, having obtained better than 80% in grade thirteen. Grade thirteen is the entrance exam for all Universities, all that is necessary to qualify for entrance to a University is 60%. Bernard De Ahreu was this brilliant boy; he entered the University of Toronto to study Chemical Engineering. Bernard is the son of Frank De Ahreu, who as many of you know took an active interest in the College and its Association, and was a member of the Committee of the Association.

He also provided St. Stanislaus with two other brilliant students, Bernard's older brothers, Terrence and Michael. They were and still are a great credit to their Alma Mater. Terrence won a Bookers Scholarship in Engineering, and after completing his term of service migrated to Canada. He entered the University of Toronto this term to do post graduate work towards his Ph.D. Michael has a very thriving dental practice in Alberta, Western Canada.

To move from the De Abreu family to the others, we come to Paul Da Silva, who had the hardest luck any student could have. Paul passed grade thirteen in 1963, and took the exam again in 1964, hoping to gain an Ontario Scholarship. After writing three exams out of nine, he came down with an attack of Chicken Pox that put paid to his aspirations. According to his master he was a sure winner, hut that was not to be. His papers were marked on his year's work and his grade thirteen certificate showed him on the honor grade in spite of his misfortune. He could not be awarded an Ontario Scholarship as he did not complete the exam, but he got so many other Scholarships and Bursaries offered him that it took him some time to decide which of these he would accept. He entered the University of Waterloo to study Nuclear Physics. Here is another product of St. Stanislaus of whom the College can be justly proud.

We find boys like Billy Newman, of Calypso fame and his Calypso understudy, Johnnie Fernandes, both of these boys made the 13th. grade, and have entered the University of Toronto to do their University Degree courses. There is obviously something which boys get out of St. Stanislaus College, that enables them to leave these shores and succeed in open competition in the outside world. I have been trying to find out what it is, I have thought of every possible thing and can only come to the conclusion that whatever it is, is built into them very early in College life, that is when they are right down at the bottom.

Peter, whose case I used last year to show what a late developing student can do when he once gets going, has been in the news many times during the last twelve months. He was elected early in the year President of the Inter-national Students Club at the University of Wisconsin, where he is studying. His election was unopposed. Then

later he won one of the five King Christian X awards for his work on the Campus. This is an award given by a Jewish organisation to commemorate the great humanitarian act of King Christian X of Denmark, who by skilful handling saved 7,000 Jews from the Nazis. He got them safely out of Denmark into neutral Sweden. It is given for inter-faith, interracial, international and into-group work on the Campus. Then last but by no means least I received a letter from the Dean of the University at the end of his second year, congratulating my wife and myself, as his parents, on his brilliant performance in his first two years of study. Here is a short extract from the letter:

"It affords me great pleasure to congratulate you on the record of your son Peter. During the past two years he has completed 63 Credits; it was necessary for him to earn 202.5 grade points to secure Sophomore honours, he has earned 214 grade points, so his record is indeed commendable. The College is proud of you son as I know you are. The need today for informed men and clear thought is greater than ever before. The completion of your son's course on the same high plane will fit him for personal success, and even more important for leadership in the affairs of the world."

I am sure you will agree with me, that that is sufficient for one year. You know now, why I have always been so interested in the welfare of our college. I am grateful for what it did for me and down the line what it did for my four boys, and is still doing for my last two sons. These two seem to be following in Peter's footsteps in being poor students. After Peter's late development, anything can happen, I can only keep my fingers crossed.
